HONORING THE LIFE AND LEGACY OF VIVIAN LASLEY-BIBBS



The public health community lost a dedicated leader and pioneer with the passing of Vivian Lasley-Bibbs, MPH. While Vivian has long stood as an esteemed Health Equity Leader and a champion of the Minority Health movement, we now pay tribute to the profound impact of Vivian, who emerged not only as a dedicated community and statewide leader but also transcended Kentucky's borders, leaving an indelible mark in Region IV, across the United States, and globally.

Throughout her acclaimed career, Vivian was devoted to advancing health equity and empowering underserved communities. Vivian's advocacy knew no bounds, embodying a legacy that defies limits, touching and inspiring countless lives. Her unwavering commitment to catalyzing change and fearlessly championing what is right stands as an enduring testament to her character.

Vivian prematurely left us, yet her impact is permanent. A principled and successful civic leader, entrepreneur, innovator, creator, planner, organizer, director, presenter, mentor, and pioneer, Vivian generously contributed to minority health, health equity, church missions, and family.

At the time of her death, Vivian worked as the Director of Disease Intervention Initiatives for CDC-funded projects through the Association of Schools and Programs of Public Health (ASPPH) Center for Public Health Workforce Development and was board president of NASOMH. She co-founded *Color of Promise*, a breast cancer advocacy group. This community-driven outreach organization spreads the message of breast cancer awareness and prevention throughout the Lexington, Kentucky community, specifically to women of color.

Vivian's passion extended beyond her work as she educated the next generation of public health leaders as a faculty member at Morgan State University. She also volunteered her time and talents to organizations like the American Public Health Association and Academy Health. Her colleagues admired and respected Vivian for her vision, leadership, compassion, and commitment to public health. Although she accomplished so much, Vivian always strove to lift those around her. Her legacy will live on through the many lives she touched and improved.

NASOMH is committed to supporting the work of our members and helping build sustainability of State Offices of Minority (SOMH), Multicultural Health, and Health Equity. This year, NASOMH has exciting work to continue, and we look forward to helping amplify work in your various states and jurisdictions.

What's ahead for this year?

NASOMH is a core member of the States, Islands, and Territories Health Equity Community of Practice (SITHE-COP), providing timely training to SOMHs on health equity and workforce development topics. CDC Adds New Social Determinants of Health Measures

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's PLACES tool now includes <u>nine new Social Determinants of Health (SDOH)</u> measures. These measures will enable public health and community planners to examine underlying social factors along with health data at the local level. This will help them better address the needs of their communities. "Social determinants of health" refer to the building blocks needed for well-being that some of us have access to, but others do not. They include non-medical factors that influence health, such as the conditions in which people are born, live, and work, and the wider systems that shape daily life.

The new measures from the American Community Survey include social factors that can impact health:

- Poverty
- Internet access
- Education
- Single-parent households
- Unemployment
- Housing

These measures will help public health and community planners identify overlapping health and social factors. This will allow them to allocate limited resources better and plan public health promotion, prevention, treatment, and management strategies.

The addition of SDOH measures to the PLACES tool provides localized data to create targeted solutions to improve community health and well-being. **Visit CDC's Places website to learn more**.

HISTORIC INVESTMENT IN **ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE FOR DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITIES**

The EPA recently announced \$2 billion in funding available through the new Community Change Grants program, delivering resources directly to marginalized communities to tackle environmental and climate challenges. This represents the single largest investment in environmental justice in history. President Biden's Inflation Reduction Act funds competitive grants to support locally-driven projects around clean energy access, climate resilience, pollution monitoring, workforce programs, and more. 100% of funding will go towards disadvantaged areas. Unique aspects aim to improve accessibility and equity:

- · Rolling 12-month application period
- Two funding tracks from \$1-20 million
- Opportunities for applicant presentations
- \$200 million for technical assistance

This timely funding can help vulnerable communities gain resources to enact solutions that reduce pollution burdens and build climate readiness.
